MORE CHAPTERS REMAIN IN SLINKARDS STORY

DOREEN & WADE SLINKARD MIGHT HAVE SLIGHTLY DIFFERENT TRAINING TECHNIQUES BUT THEY BOTH POSSESS A STRONG PASSION FOR RACEHORSES words: BEN FLORES PICTURE: BRADLEY PHOTOGRAPHERS

or Wade and Doreen Slinkard, their love affair with horses began a long time ago in different circumstances, but for the pair, a chance meeting in

Conargo Pub, 20 miles west of Deniliquin sealed their fate. As a six-year-old, Doreen watched her mother as

she ironed every Saturday, listening to the races in the background. Her mum would have the occasional bet with the local SP bookie in Ashburton, Victoria where Doreen grew up.

She can remember her mother's ironing quicken as the horse she'd backed went faster, which Doreen found amusing.

"I can remember one day looking behind the radio to see where the horses were," Doreen said. "My mum laughed and said 'Dad and I will take you next Saturday to see them race."

That next Saturday was the beginning of Doreen's love of racing. The other half of the Slinkard duo, who hails from West Pennant Hills in NSW, was a young jackaroo working for a prominent family in the Riverina region of NSW where, among stock horses, the family also bred Thoroughbreds.

Wade had his eye on a two-year-old Thoroughbred and talked the family into letting him break it in and train him for the picnic races.

NAMED VAN GLOW, HE WENT ON TO ANNIHILATE HIS PIONIC RIVALS AND FINISHED HIS CAREER WINNING 11 TAB RACES.

Deniliquin trainer Tom Loy took Wade under his wing and officially trained Van Glow, however, the experience was just the beginning of Wade's foray into racehorse training.

Partners in everything but their professional lives, Wade

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and Doreen Slinkard have been both opponents and allies at different stages in their careers.

Now both winding down their training practices, the pair is content training a few horses at a time, with Doreen's new found career as a children's book author and novelist requiring her undivided attention.

Doreen began writing stories for her children around 30 years ago. They usually centred around life on the farm and training racehorses, but contained subtle moral underpinnings.

Doreen thought it would be a novel way to keep the memories alive for her children and grandchildren but never took to finding a publisher.

There is an interesting dichotomy with Doreen's dual careers. On reflection, Doreen has no qualms with acknowledging she has no claims to racing fame, but delights in the winners she has trained.

"Des Hoysted interviewed me after Shenanigan (one of the best horses Doreen trained) won at Canterbury and asked 'How many do you train Doreen?'

"I replied 'Oh they just give me a couple to shut me up."

"I do feel though that I've gotten the best out of every horse I've trained and I'm so satisfied in just having these beautiful animals around me."

On the other hand Wade achieved probably his greatest success early on in his career with Cheval De Volee.

Cheval De Volee ended up rated among the top 10 two-year-olds in Australasia after winning the Tiny Tot Stakes by five lengths; a Golden Slipper prelude race and the Pago Pago by five.

Unfortunately, Chevel De Volee never made it to the Golden Slipper but did go on to beat the great Manikato home in the Sires' Produce, claiming fourth place.

More recently, the Slinkards have become well-known for their connection with the 'Ausbred' horses.

TRAINING AROUND 15 BETWEEN THEM, THE MOST FAMOUS AND SUCCESSFUL OF THE GROUP WAS A GELDING OUT OF A STORMY ZEPHYR MARE WHICH WAS RACED BY CHRIS LAWLOR, WHO BEGAN THE AUSBRED DYNASTY.

Ausbred King amassed over \$420,000 in prizemoney in his career with his finest moment coming, rather symbolically, on Golden Slipper day in 2009 when he won the Listed-Neville Sellwood Stakes in heavy conditions with Kathy O'Hara aboard.

You would expect some similarities in training styles after decades spent working together, with Wade acknowledging the pair shares traits – although Doreen would have us believe that it is because she successfully "trained Wade."

Wade describes his style as more of the "old school." He prefers to let his charges have one to two days off with a hand pick of grass – a luxury afforded for the pair that lives on the picturesque Windermere Farm, in Sydney's Hawkesbury region.

DOREEN FINDS WADE'S STYLE TO CONSIST OF BRINGING HORSES UP TO CONDITION SLOWLY BY TRAINING THEIR LEGS TO WITHSTAND THE PRESSURES OF RACING AND BY DEVELOPING THEIR LUNG CAPACITY WITH INTENSE SHORT BURST TRAINING.

Swimming assists as well; and it also helps that Wade and Doreen have a swimming channel on their farm.

As a young woman, Doreen worked with Angus Armanasco, whom Wade attributes to influencing Doreen's training regimen as well as her philosophy.

Although their styles differ slightly, the pair seems to have a more bipartisan relationship, with each party dispensing advice (although this can lead to heated discussions) to the other.

The one thing they are unequivocal about is their mission to keep their horses as happy and as close to their natural environment as possible.

Doreen has begun a new chapter in her story though, and only has time to manage a couple of horses these days.

She has published five of her children's stories, conducted a tour of Beijing and is in the process of having her books adopted by the Chinese Education Department.

Only recently Doreen completed her first novel – *Women, Horses and War*; a story which follows an orphan's journey through to his time as a light Horseman during the First World War.

Already working on a sequel, Wade likes to think he's had a hand in compelling Doreen to write for adults, but confides that she needs no help with ideas.

In his spare time, Wade likes to cook and calls himself a shearer's cook, or a short order chef but there are rumours he's quite a deft hand in the kitchen.

Wade has 10 horses in work at the moment and is looking forward to training some nice yearlings in the future; but if the pair starts looking to make the move to a professional partnership, what about a cook-book?
